Catechetical Corner

Elements of a Christian Marriage



What are the essential elements of a Christian marriage? Here are key elements that define union between a man and woman in a Christian marriage:

- (1) **Unity:** Marriage is a covenant that by its very nature brings about physical, emotional, intellectual, and spiritual union between a man and a woman.
- (2) **Indissolubility:** Marriage lasts “... until death do us part.”
- (3) **Openness to generating new life:** Every marriage must be open to the gift of children.
- (4) **Commitment to the spouse’s welfare:** “... In sickness and in health, in good times and in bad...” “Sexuality, by means of which man and woman give themselves to one another through the acts which are proper and exclusive to spouses, is not something simply biological, but concerns the innermost being of the human person as such. It is realized in a truly human way only if it is an integral part of the love by which a man and woman commit themselves totally to one another until death” (CCC #2361). Through the sexual act and openness to children, the marriage bond is strengthened and the unity between husband and wife become a wonderful sign of God’s love and fidelity to His children.

Happy 83rd Anniversary, Santa Teresita!

On August 2, 2013, Santa Teresita celebrated 83 years serving the San Gabriel Valley and beyond in healthcare ministry, providing skill, compassion, and a commitment to preserving the dignity of all human life from conception to natural death. Beginning as a tubercular unit for young girls in 1930, Santa Teresita originally consisted of an old farmhouse, a garage, and two small buildings. The Carmelite Sisters worked hard in “shaping up” the property and purchasing equipment, turning the tiny cottages, which were once chicken coups, into patients’ rooms and converting the old garage into a hall for ambulatory patients. Today, responding to the dramatic changes in the health care climate, we have essentially gone back to our roots. With a particular focus on the long-term needs of the elderly, we are once again, “shaping up” the property and building new “cottages.” By their design and with our dedicated healthcare staff, we communicate our commitment to affirm and defend the beauty, purpose and sacredness of all human life.

While a person’s physical capacities may diminish over time, the individual does not. We all have a capacity to continue to grow in vibrancy, interior beauty and in experiencing an inner fullness in each moment that we are alive. Today, Santa Teresita continues its mission of being “*At the Service of the Family for Life*” by incorporating the whole family in a unique intergenerational approach to eldercare.

Have you ever passed by the Cafeteria on Saturday mornings and wondered what all those people were doing, gathered around tables, chatting and laughing? That group is formally called *Our Lady of Mount Carmel Rosary Makers*, or simply the “*Rosary Makers*.” The group started in the late 1990’s and included Ben & Lilly Temilloso, Emma Villa, and Cristina Nera under the devoted guidance of Sister Teresina, who faithfully met every Saturday morning. “*Now we have 45 rosary makers*,” says Sr. Teresina, “... and we have given away more than 336,000 rosaries to those who do not have a rosary and to the missions in countries all over the world, including India, the Philippines, Nigeria, Mexico, and Poland.” When asked how many years he had been a part of the group, Adolf Corzo says, “*When things are rewarding, you don’t count.*” These wonderful volunteers hand-bead each and every rosary, using a variety of colors and lovingly crafting each one in honor of our Blessed Mother. Many of the rosary makers are long-time volunteers, residents, or family of residents who have somehow been affiliated with Santa Teresita.
